

A Penny on the Sidewalk

ou always hear the usual stories of pennies on the sidewalk being good luck, gifts from angels, etc. This is the first time I've ever heard this twist on the story. It gives you something to think about.

"Several years ago, a friend of mine and her husband were invited to spend the weekend at the husband's employer's home. My friend, Arlene, was nervous about the weekend. The boss was very wealthy, with a fine home on the waterway and cars costing more than her house. The husband's employer was quite generous as a host and took them to the finest restaurants. Arlene knew she would never have the opportunity to indulge in this kind of extravagance again and was enjoying herself immensely.

As the three of them were about to enter an exclusive restaurant that evening, the boss was walking slightly ahead of Arlene and her husband. He stopped suddenly, looking down on the pavement for a long, silent moment. Arlene wondered if she was supposed to pass him. There was nothing on the ground except a single darkened penny that someone had dropped and a few cigarette butts. Still silent, the man reached down and picked up the penny. He held it up and smiled, then put it in his pocket as if he had found a great treasure. What need did this man have for a single penny? Why would he even take the time to stop and pick it up?

Throughout dinner, the entire scene nagged at her. Finally, she could stand it no longer. She casually mentioned that her daughter once had a coin collection and asked if the penny he had found had been of some value. A smile crept across the man's face as he reached into his pocket for the penny and held it out for her to see.

'Look at it.' He said. 'Read what it says.' She read the words, 'United States of America.' 'No, not that; read further.' 'One cent?' 'No, keep reading.' 'In God We Trust?' 'Yes!' 'And?' 'And if I trust in God, the name of God is holy, even on a coin. Whenever I find a coin, I see that inscription. It is written on every single United States coin, but we never seem to notice it! God drops a message right in front of me telling me to trust Him? Who am I to pass it by? When I see a coin, I pray, I stop to see if my trust IS in God at that moment. I pick the coin up as a response to God, that I do trust in Him. For a short time at least, I cherish it as if it were gold. I think it is God's way of starting a conversation with me. Lucky for me, God is patient, and pennies are plentiful!'" When I was out shopping today, I found a penny on the sidewalk. I stopped and picked it up and realized that I had been worrying and fretting in my mind about things I cannot change. I read the words, "In God We Trust," and had to laugh. Yes, God, I get the message.

It seems that I have been finding an inordinate number of pennies in the last few months, but then, pennies are plentiful! And, God is patient...

just returned from the Triennial session of the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons. Unfortunately, I was unable to stay for the General Grand Council business session so I don't know yet what happened there. The reason I mention this is that the delegates to the General Grand Chapter session exhibited admirable courage and leadership by setting their dues to an amount that will sustain the organization adequately in accomplishing its mission. They are to be congratulated and hopefully emulated. I suspect that some Grand Chapters will withdraw their membership because of this action. If so, that's sad.

I have heard the question posed more than once, "What do they do for us?" That is a nonsensical question to me and exhibits the ignorance of the questioner. There are two things wrong with that question. First, "they" are us. The General Grand Chapter is a voluntary association of Chapter Masons who pool their resources through their Grand Chapters for the promotion of Royal Arch Masonry and its purposes. Second, the General Grand Chapter is not supposed to do anything for us. We are supposed to work together through the General Grand Chapter to promote York Rite Masonry.

The last two or three generations of members of the Masonic fraternity, including mine, I call the "moocher" generations. They inherited marvelous stately buildings and a considerable amount of cash from their predecessors and were expected to maintain the facilities, invest the assets to promote the order, to accomplish the great mission of promoting harmony and morality within our society, and to pass the assets on to today's generation with interest. Instead, we spent the money on ourselves, let the marvelous buildings decay, bankrupted the fraternity, and left virtually no resources for subsequent generations of Freemasons.

The current generation of Freemasons is in the process of taking the fraternity back from the moochers and rebuilding, almost from scratch, what the previous generations destroyed or squandered. I believe the decision made by the delegates to the General Grand Chapter is evidence of this, as is the construction of the new Scottish Rite building in Chicago and thousands of other "points of light" which I see developing almost daily.

I am proud to see the General Grand Chapter showing this courage and leadership and can only hope that one day I can rejoin them in this effort. Meanwhile, all you young guys, keep the faith, don't be discouraged by the moochers, and above all, keep your focus on our mission of making the world a better place to live in, one man at a time.



t is a pleasure to thank the Knights Templar Eye Foundation for your grant to support Dr. Mary Whitman's research entitled "Oculomotor axon growth and guidance in normal development and in congenital fibrosis of the extraocular muscles (CFEOM)."

The causes of most forms of strabismus (misalignment of the eyes), including severe forms like CFEOM, are unknown. With the foundation's support, Dr. Whitman and her team will study the genetic mutations that are known to cause a deficit in the cranial nerves that control eye movement leading to CFEOM. This work may provide valuable insights into the development of this limiting condition as well as of more common forms of strabismus.

On behalf of Boston Children's Hospital, I extend my deepest thanks to the Knights Templar Eye Foundation for its commitment to our critical research efforts.



oss Hart, the playwright who died in 1961, wrote his autobiography called "Act One." In it he tells a story about his father and the poverty that encircled his life and the desperate times through which Moss Hart and his parents had to suffer.

It was Christmas Eve. Father and son had walked along 145th Street in New York. The big stores were brilliant with lights. Windows were aglow with colors and ornaments. Push carts were laden with toys. The young boy's eyes were full of anticipation, but Moss Hart knew there was little money for extras. He heard his father's hand jingle a few coins in his pocket, but always the price was too much. His father's face showed the disappointment.

"It's all right, Dad," the son said. "It doesn't matter. I love you." On and on they shivered homeward. "I wanted just to put my hand in his," Moss Hart later recalled, "but we were not on that basis, and we walked home in silence."

Years later, when Moss Hart visited his father at age ninety-one in Florida, it was Christmas Eve again. The two of them sat together on a sofa and looked through the family album of youthful years. Quietly and gently the father's hand fell on his son's. It was the first time their lives had met. Two hands touched each other. It was enough. The wall between them had been broken down.

Christmas is one of those times when walls can be broken. It is a time to celebrate and touch each other with love, warmth, and understanding. That's what it was when God opened the curtains of heaven to let the birth of the Christ-Child shine through so that His hand may be in our hand, joining together in hope, confidence, and reassurance.



it came to be known, was the symbolic completion of the Erie Canal, the most important waterway of its day and the engineering project that once and for all sealed New York City's future as the most important commercial city in America.





















Creating Engaged New Members One Sir Knight At A Time

t is no secret that some experiences in life are better suited to groups while others are intended more for the individual. Although surrounded by friends, the experience of being raised or knighted alone conveys a powerful sense of individualization that is inevitably compromised to some extent when conferred in a group of candidates, even though each candidate may be raised or knighted individually in sequence.

For the sake of expediency and practicality, Masonry has resorted to conferring degrees upon candidates in small groups, and on certain occasions, upon larger gatherings during so-called festivals. In today's busy world, these events are deemed essential to the timely conferral of degrees for those candidates who might not otherwise find it practical to join our ranks. While such candidates are no less "Masonic" than others, at the very least, they are deprived of solely individualized experiences.

With some notable exceptions, observation suggests that "festival" candidates remain less bonded and less engaged with their Masonic bodies, as is reflected in higher absenteeism and suspension rates.

This is simply human nature. We tend to bond better with those who make us feel special, who pay attention to us as what we are, unique individuals. Statistics may differ over time, but it often seems that the more candidates a Ma-

sonic body may process in mass events, the lower their relative attendance at stated meetings and social occasions, both in sheer numbers and as a percentage of their membership base.

Having said that, group degrees do have their place, such as full-form Red Cross and Malta conferrals (and of course the degree of Royal Arch Mason mandates three candidates at one and the same time), but we should endeavor to respect the intrinsic value of devoting our attention to the knighting of each individual candidate. Whenever we do so, Commanderies should make it clear to candidates that this effort was made to convey the value of an individualized experience.

In instances when lone knightings are not possible, it is the duty of the Commandery to explain to each candidate prior to receiving the Order of the Temple that although he may be knighted on the same day with others, a singular honor is being bestowed upon him. He is bound personally as a man and a Christian Mason in a sacred oath with our Lord and Saviour—irrespective of the presence of other candidates.

Throughout York Rite Freemasonry, every candidate is ritualistically reminded that although each man is born into a world of countless others of which he is but one member, his soul shall someday stand alone before his Creator and Supreme Judge. Thus, each Commandery has a responsibility to knight



every member as "individually" as possible, sincerely and proficiently. Several Commanderies around our state have a reputation for doing an outstanding job at this.

This approach may so deeply affect the candidate that we might discover we have added not just another member to our ranks, but an engaged Sir Knight. As such, he may be motivated to assist in re-creating more individualized experiences for successive new members in the same manner that his knighting made an indelible impression upon him.


