Templar Knights in history: Roger de Flor (1266 - 1306) was arguably the most famous Templar who was a sergeant-brother, not a knight. Roger de Flor, also known by his original German name of Rutger von Blume, was a captain in the Templar fleet. After he was banished from the Order on charges of exhorting money from passengers during the siege of Acre in 1291, Roger sought employment around the Mediterranean, eventually becoming a pirate. De Flor's assassination was ordered by the Byzantine Emperor Michael IX Palaeologus.

Prelate's Message

Sir Knights and brothers all:

As the Sundays of October wind to a close Ordinary Time of this liturgical year for the church, we hear Our Lord Jesus speak parables about the Kingdom of God. This is fitting, as it must be, to prepare us to start anew when advent begins each year, always with a careful eye, so that we may recognize if this is the Advent of Advents for which all humanity waits. We constantly need trained, and retrained, to understand the nature of the Kingdom of God, just like a mighty army needs to train and retrain for battle. For when the fullness of the Kingdom of God begins to break through this world it will most assuredly be missed by many until much of what remains of the present has passed away!

Perhaps we should consider these parables are just difficult enough to stretch our understanding of things to better comprehend the nuances of the Kingdom of God when it is being revealed. Just like difficult math problems teach young children how to think differently about problem solving. Or, how in the interpretation of art between two people looking at the same painting can reveal perspectives not seen by the other. Theological study, with scripture in one hand and a commentary in the other, is an armor for the intellectual theologian within every Christian; a necessary training of any level of experience.

Our study of these parables becomes a training ground, I propose, especially for those whose oath is to be ready in battle (physically by the sword or spiritually by prayer) to defend Christ's Holy Church until it is eternally triumphant. It would be wonderful if each of our commanderies across this great commonwealth were to dust off these pieces of armor and start training again! It is quite simple! Many of us spend an hour rehearsing duties, sword tactics, steps, and ritual each month. What do you think Christ could do with us if we picked up the Word and trained ourselves in it again, just as regularly?

Maybe, all it would take is 15 minutes of your commandery rehearsal night to begin with prayer, a reading of scripture, and a short commentary by one of the great church fathers. Or, a few times throughout the year devote some time together in a real study of scripture, a roundtable discussion, or invite a local clergy or two for dinner with your commandery and ask them to discuss a chapter or parable with the members. If we are true to our faith, each one of us sees a member of the clergy every Sunday... why not invite them to learn about your commandery, share a study with you, and maybe hand them a Holy Land Pilgrimage application!

If you would like to introduce a little study armor in your commandery, just ask! I'd be happy to share some material, commentary, or guidance. And, any of our Grand Prelates would be more than happy to help in this cause, as I'm sure each of us has more books than we know what to do with anymore. Building up the spiritual knowledge of the faithful is important as we draw closer to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, and when He comes, may He find us ready, and by His merit alone, may He make us worthy of His Kingdom Eternal.
