On November 11, 1919, the fighting of World War I ended with an Armistice. On November 11, 1920, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed November 11<sup>th</sup> as Armistice Day. President Dwight Eisenhower changed the name to Veterans Day in 1954 to honor veterans of all wars. Today we honor all those who have served. We thank them for their patriotism, sacrifice, love of country, and willingness to serve our country.

The other event that we celebrate is Thanksgiving. According to historians, the Pilgrims celebrated their first successful harvest in the fall of 1621 in Massachusetts. In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed that Thanksgiving should be celebrated on the final Thursday in November. On December 26, 1941, President Franklin Roosevelt changed the celebration of Thanksgiving to the fourth Thursday in November.

Sir Knights, I ask you to remember at this time that this is not always a joyous time for all of our fellow Sir Knights. Many are alone. I encourage you to reach out to them. ## News of Education Foundation for 2022

The Knights Templar Education Foundation of CT will once again be accepting applicants for grants for the scholastic year 2022-2023. With much of the COVID uncertainties hopefully behind us, compared to 2021, the Foundation expects an up-tic in scholars excited to begin or to resume their studies. The rules are simple and the grants are generous. An application must be filed by the deadline (March 1, 2022) and applicants must show CT residency. In keeping with current technology trends, electronic filings of both students and guidance departments are acceptable, but students need to arrange early for transcripts and letters of recommendation. In other words, students should NOT wait until the last minute, as students have been turned away for missing the deadline. For those continuing in their studies, an updated dossier is required, and a grant award is not automatic.

The forms which detail the requirements and qualifications for grant consideration are available from Chm Miller, or Recorders of your local Commandery. Awards will be announced in May.
