Templar Knights in history: Geoffroi de Charney (1252 - March 1314). At the height of his career de Charney held an important position as the Preceptor of Normandy. He was burned at the stake in Paris alongside Jacques de Molay, as both proclaimed the Order's innocence. It is presumed that the de Charney family remained in possession of the most cherished Templar relic which was later revealed to the public by a French knight named Geoffroi de Charney in the 1350's. Today this relic is known as the Shroud of Turin.
